Subject: Arizona Voters Oppose ACA Repeal; Voters Say They Will Blame GOP for Upcoming Rate Increases



A new Public Policy Polling survey finds that voters in Arizona say they would be less likely to vote for a candidate who supports repealing the Affordable Care Act by a 13-point margin (46%-33%). Further, by a 22-point margin, Arizona voters oppose repealing the Affordable Care Act and instead want to keep what works and fix what doesn't. A majority of voters – 55% – say they'll hold Republicans in Washington responsible for health care premium increase announcements this summer and fall – a gaping 26-point margin over those who would not.

Key findings from the survey include:

- By a 57-35 margin, voters say they want to keep what works about the Affordable Care Act and fix what doesn't, rather than repeal it and start over with a new healthcare law independent voters agree by a 69-25 margin.
- There's strong evidence that Republican efforts to repeal the ACA will hurt Arizona Republicans at the ballot box this November. A plurality of voters, 46%, say they'd be less likely to vote for a candidate who supports repeal, including 58% of independents and even 27% of Republicans.
- Voters say they will blame Republicans if health care premiums increase this summer. 55% say they will hold Republicans in Washington responsible if rates increase, compared to just 29% who said they would not.
- A plurality of voters (49%) say they believe Washington Republicans and President Trump have been trying to undermine and sabotage the Affordable Care Act and a majority of independent voters (57%) also say they agree with that statement.

PPP surveyed 525 registered voters Arizona from May 9-10, 2018. The margin of error is +/- 4.2%. The survey was conducted using automated telephone interviews for Protect Our Care.
